PCC Meeting


On Monday 29th September the Church Council will meet to discuss the work of our Church both here and in our wider community. Please pray for them as they discern what God's plans are for us.

Connect Group Update

Who are the DayTimers?

We are a group of a dozen or so members from different Christian backgrounds and nationalities who meet each Wednesday morning in the church building for Bible study, prayer, support and friendship.

When and where do you meet?

We meet at the church, either in the small hall or the meeting room. We start with coffee at 11am and our meetings usually last an hour and a half.

What do you value as a group?

The thing that we most value about our group is that it is a safe space where we can share our joys and sorrows knowing that we will be listened to in confidence and non-judgmentally. No question is too 'silly' or 'unimportant'.

Our meetings vary, either following a book of the Bible or an interesting topic. Different people lead the studies, which leads to variety in the styles

of study. But people's needs are always at the forefront of our meetings. If someone comes in distress our focus will be on them. We aim to enfold them in God's love and envelop them in an atmosphere of nurturing faith. With prayer and honest conversation we encourage one another to turn to God and move forward with Him.

Tell us about something you have found challenging as a group. What did you learn?

Sometimes we have found passages difficult to interpret but through discussion we have found that we can resolve problems and learn from one another. We often share experiences to put our points across which helps us to gain a deeper understanding of God's Word.

Can I join, and if so, who do I contact?

Yes, of course! Whatever age you are and are free on a Wednesday morning, you are welcome to join us. Let Morgen know and she'll put you in touch: admin@ststephens-ealing.org.

Is there anything else you would like to tell us?

We have an active WhatsApp Group where we share uplifting messages, prayer requests and useful information. We also meet socially-usually over food!



The Grove Community Church

The Grove Community Church is a plant from St Stephen's and has been in place since 2018. It is one of our Mission Partners and is run by Mark Tate and his team, supported actively by several members of St Stephen's.

In recent years they have been working toward opening a Community Grocery and are really excited to announce that it should be opening next month. Beth Koch, the Community Grocery Assistant Manager tells us more.

What is a community grocery?

We describe a Community Grocery as the bridge between a food bank and a low-cost supermarket. Customers can become members for just £5 a year, which gives them access to daily shops for much cheaper than your average store. We sell a range of fresh fruit and vegetables, shelf products and fridge/freezer items as well as necessary household products.

When did they start?

Community Groceries are run by the Message Trust in partnership with local churches and were created after the pandemic in response to the rise of the cost-of-living crisis. There are now around 30 Community Grocery's across the UK helping thousands of families get the weekly essentials they need.

Why Gurnell Grove?

Gurnell Grove is an estate in Ealing in which many families struggle with food poverty and their finances. Therefore, the Grove Community Church have been keen to help provide in this practical way by starting our own Community Grocery in the heart of the estate right next to the community centre.

What's the latest?

After 4 years of hard work and many ups and downs, Planning permission was finally secured in May 2025 and we have been able to get the ball rolling with the process of



building the Community Grocery

In June, the foundations of the Grocery were dug up and built, ready for the three cabins to be secured on top! We are hoping the cabins will arrive and be kitted out ready for the shop launch this October/November.

What can I pray for?

- Financial provision for the third cabin and ongoing food/general costs
- Good connections with a variety of local food suppliers
- For the right volunteer team who have the heart and vision to bring God's love to our members as well as practical help.



Remembering Enid

Enid was the first member of St Stephen's I met when our family moved to Ealing just before Christmas. I was taking my son, Josiah, out for a walk, and she happened to arrive home just as we went past her house. She came up to me and said, 'You're the new vicar, aren't you? I'm Enid, the licensed lay minister. I don't suppose I could borrow your keys?' I came to learn that losing church keys was one of Enid's endearing qualities. She found them several weeks later in her rucksack.

It didn't take me long to realise that Enid was a pillar of the St Stephen's community. But her influence extended far beyond our local church family. When I was first able to say that I'd accepted an offer to become the vicar of St Stephen's, a clergy friend shared how he had worked closely with Enid on General Synod (the top-most governing body of the Church of England). It turned out that Enid has been instrumental in the Church of England stepping up its efforts to respond to climate change, calling on every diocese (a Church county) to put an environmental programme in place, and to develop a range of tools that would help local churches monitor their carbon emissions.

These programmes and tools are now routinely used across the country. But Enid's legacy extends much further, because her efforts paved the way for the Church of England to commit to the ambitious target of meeting net zero carbon emissions by 2030, fifteen years sooner than first planned. Enid's legacy as the self-confessed 'Eco-Granny' isn't restricted to





St Stephen's; it has shaped the whole Church of England.

Over the last few weeks, many of us have been remembering Enid and the impact that she had on our lives. Others of us knew Enid much better than I did, but let me share with you what I saw in her and why her loss is so keenly felt

Enid was ever the practical sort, and she contributed to just about every area of church life in her many years at St Stephen's. As she mentioned when we first met, she was a licensed lay minister which among other things meant she led services, preached, visited people at home and in hospital, and led prayers of intercession. She was a member of the prayer ministry team, and she led services of Morning Prayer every Tuesday morning on Zoom. She was a key member of the gardening team, and took particular pride in the potted bed outside the front of the church, widely known as 'Enid's Garden'. She helped with children's work, and my wife Hannah has fond memories of Enid helping Josiah with his colouring in JAM one Sunday morning. As if that wasn't enough, Enid also helped set up the People and Planet connect group and organised associated activities to raise awareness of climate change and other environmental causes. She also served terms on the PCC and as a Churchwarden.

Enid did many things, and her passing leaves holes in many teams and rotas. However, the biggest holes aren't found in the things she did; they're found in the person she was. It's been touching to read the various tributes that have been made by our community over recent weeks. Several themes stand out.

First, **Enid had great compassion.** Enid pursued a world that was fair and that treated everyone with dignity. Wherever she sensed inequality, indifference or pain, she would respond quickly and try to bring the love of God into the situation. I've shared already about the remarkable work she did in the area of climate justice. But as the name of the Connect Group she started suggests, she cared not just about the planet but also its people. Like Jesus, she had particular concern for the lost, the last and the least; in



other words, those whom the world usually overlooks. She would support the homeless in our area, and she cared deeply for the most vulnerable people in our community. She was a great advocate, giving a voice to the voiceless, and friendship to those who felt forgotten. Her compassion was indeed great.

Second, Enid was a wonderful encourager. Enid would be the first to admit that she didn't agree with everyone on everything! But there was always space in Enid's heart to encourage others. One set of reflections that I have found particularly touching came from our Parents of Little Ones (POLO) connect group, who shared how Enid always made them and their children feel so welcome, even though they attended the later service time. Enid's warmth and generosity shone through her, qualities that put other people at great ease.

Third and finally, **Enid stirred faith in others**. Reading the stories that we have shared about Enid, I've been struck by the number of people who said Enid was pivotal in them beginning or renewing their journey of faith at St Stephen's.



Perhaps this was because Enid's great compassion meant that she was always on the lookout for those on the periphery. But I also think it's because Enid's faith was honest. Enid helped people to see that faith in Jesus was realistic, and that the best way to grow in faith was to journey with others who were trying to follow Jesus as well. It's a reminder to us that we don't need to have all the answers before we come to Jesus (Enid wrestled with the Bible just like anyone else). All we need to do is come, and indeed to invite others to come that we might know Jesus better together.

Enid leaves a remarkable legacy, and her loss is keenly felt. But we can have every confidence that she is with the Lord who loves her and gave his life for her so that she might live.

Her funeral will be at 12 noon this Friday 5th September at St Stephen's Church. The wake will follow immediately afterwards in the church hall. All are welcome.

Let me close with these simple words: 'Well done good and faithful servant.'
